Workers' compensation law is often treated like an orphan in the legal world. A specialized area of the law that does not quite fit in with any other areas of practice. In many instances, this isolation carries over to the agencies that adjudicate workers' compensation claims and the foundation of their ethical governance. Some workers' compensation adjudicators fall under an executive agency, others are part of an independent agency, while some fall squarely within the judicial branch. We will discuss origins of judicial governance in different jurisdictions and their application to different hypothetical scenarios.

Professional Employer Organizations (PEOs) have emerged in the modern economy under the general rubric of "employee leasing." In many industries, such as the entertainment, supply chain logistics, farming, and service industries, the need for labor fluctuates based on operational needs. Workers' compensation professionals have a huge learning curve to understand the relationship between injured workers and the determination of who is responsible for work injuries when the injured worker is a "leased" employee. Sometimes the analysis of workers' compensation liability is like peeling an onion, with many separate entities involved with a given claim. This program unpeels the onion for the audience and explains how insurance laws govern liability for general and special employers.
